Redeemed! > Psalm 130:1-8

130:1-2 Hope for the Lord's mercy. Much like a song, we begin this first "verse" with a cry, a need: the psalmist needs the Lord to hear, is desperate for the mercy of God.

130:3-4 Hope that comes from fear. Moving into the "chorus" of the song, the psalmist tells us of his hope: the Lord doesn't hold a grudge, he doesn't keep a list of "naughty and nice." Instead, the Lord actually and truly forgives.

130:5-6 Hope for the Lord to act. The psalmist waits on the Lord – he waits not passively, but actively: with faith, with hope, with genuine trust. This is a believing kind of patience.

130:7-8 *Hope in the Lord.* The final part of the psalm brings together themes from all throughout, focusing primarily on redemption: God will redeem his people. They will be rescued and restored into relationship with him.

Background: The Psalms of Ascent served as reminders of faith for God's people as they traveled to the yearly festivals.

The Point: The cross of Christ is where our brokenness meets God's forgiveness. His grace is enough to redeem His people.

Head: Know that our God forgives all who call upon Him.

Heart: Believe that the Lord is not like our world – He isn't looking to condemn. Rather, He invites all who trust Christ into an eternal life filled with hope, love, and redemption.

Hands: Who will you remind of Christ's hope this week?
